INTRODUCTION

The presented here collection of studies and sketches has been inspired by the conference *Evolution of Constitutionalism in the Visegrad Group Member States*, which was held on the 11th and 12th May, 2010. It was the second conference organised as part of the cycle *Days of Law in Central and Eastern European Countries* by the Faculty of Law of the University of Białystok. This year's conference could be organised thanks to financial support granted by the Visegrad Fund. The conference was honoured by the presence of academics from universities representing states of the Visegrad Group: Masaryk University (the Czech Republic), Trnava University (Slovakia), Corvinus University of Budapest and University of Pécs (Hungary) as well as – acting as hosts – academics from the Department of Constitutional Law of the Faculty of Law of the University of Białystok (Poland). Special guests at the conference were representatives of the Yanka Kupala State University of Grodno (Belarus). Articles submitted to this collection have been written mostly by authors who presented their papers at the conference. The subject matter of particular studies prompted the editors of this volume to classify them into five parts. The first part contains studies devoted to general theoretical and political as well as comparative issues. The second part includes articles submitted by Polish authors and devoted to the area of Polish constitutional law. The third part is dedicated to works related to the protection of individual's rights. The fourth part embraces articles handed in by academics from the Yanka Kupala State University of Grodno and devoted to Belarusian law. The fifth part is composed of studies devoted to constitutional issues of other countries, mainly Russia.

The editors wish to express their sincere thanks to all individuals and institutions that made their contribution to the organization of the conference and publishing this book. They would like to thank especially the Dean of the Faculty of Law Professor Leonard Etel for organizational and financial support and Professor Marian Grzybowski, the Head of the Department of Constitutional Law at the Faculty of Law of the University of Białystok for academic guidance throughout
